No Second Chance is a Youth Safety Campaign with the objective of saving teenage lives through education about the dangers of street violence and safe driving. The team of presenters included Matt Speakman who became paraplegic after being hit by a drunk driver while riding his motorbike, Paul Stanley whose son tragically died after an assault at a party, and Warren Luff a multiple time motor racing champion. The actual program is a tool that *can* be used to support the Year 7/8 HPE Australian Curriculum with additional information and resources to explore same sex attracted and gender diversity topics. Aberfoyle Park High School isn’t delivering this program, but it’s worth exploring if you are interested or have questions. Being a member school with the Safe Schools Coalition means that as a school we are prepared to tackle homophobia and transphobia, and ensure we are a safe, supportive and inclusive environment.
